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Superintendent's Message



Dear Faculty and Staff:

June is traditionally a time when I reflect on the year. At last Tuesday's Board of Education meeting I mentioned a number of tough issues that the Board of Education, working with school district staff, has resolved this year. Since many people were voting in the referendum and may have missed it (or don't want to watch it on FairTV), here is a brief list.

It's easy, sometimes, to dwell on the difficulties of the past year instead of the successes. While not all of these matters were resolved to everyone's satisfaction, the resolution of the issues allows the district to move forward on improving teaching and learning. These are in no particular order.

- Change in the middle school feeder pattern
- Breathalyzer policy passed
- Complete update of the student discipline policy
- Commissioned and received new enrollment projections based on different methodology
- Commissioned and received study on elementary capacity
- The Operational Audit - selected a firm, provided data, set up five days of site visits, reviewed the report, provided a written response to each point and incorporated some of it into the budget
- Approved an updated Long-Range Facilities Plan
- Agreed on common high school Academic Expectations and Grading Guidelines
- Revised all policies as recommended by the CABA Audit
- Budget was done in a new format with greater transparency and credibility
- A new elementary staffing model providing greater support to students in math and reading will be in place next year
- A new model for gifted education will be in place next year in elementary and middle schools
- Significant expansion of the pre-school program
- Amended Racial Imbalance Plan approved by the State
- Approval of the Sherman project (core upgrades)
- Approval of Fairfield Woods expansion so that it will be done in time for September 2011 occupancy
- Near completion of Stratfield project

- Settled several employment contracts within Board of Education guidelines
- Implemented the State's Healthy Food Certification initiative
- Provided a District Improvement Plan and began implementation by working with the entire administrative team on improving instruction and supervision throughout the year.

While this is not a complete list, it does show that many of the issues that had been unresolved one year ago (and some had been pending for quite some time) are now resolved in a positive manner.

Riverfield - The school held its annual *Family Math Night* for grades 2-5. Students, parents, teachers and volunteers had a great time estimating, completing surveys, solving puzzles and playing math games that support all strands of math.

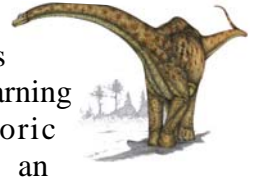


McKinley - Grade 5 students had a hand in creating one of the largest indoor collaborative art pieces in the world. The students recently painted images that will be
