

# Celebrations of the Fairfield Public Schools

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## Superintendent's Message



Dear Faculty and Staff:

I am pleased to report that, on Tuesday night, the Fairfield Board of Education approved my proposed budget of \$148,505,841, a 4.9 percent increase over current spending. The Board held three meetings to ask questions about the budget and discuss its details with me and my staff. In the end, the Board unanimously endorsed the budget as proposed.

One of my goals this year in developing the budget was to simplify the budget document so that it would be easier for everyone to understand. I was pleased to hear so many positive comments from Board members and public speakers that they believed we had met this goal. We especially wanted to be clear about where we currently spend our grant money and the impact on the loss of federal stimulus dollars had on the budget proposal. The so-called "funding cliff" that you may have heard about is real.

On the substantive side, my goal was to preserve our excellent educational program in Fairfield while being sensitive to the fiscal climate. Many worthwhile requests did not make it into my proposed budget for this reason. We have legitimate needs in technology and major maintenance projects, for example, that I could not include.

While I am not due to report to the Board on my reaction to the Operational Audit until March 8, we did identify some savings in the budget that were suggested by the Audit. For example, absorbing some custodial and utility costs into the food service program preserves dollars in the operating budget for valuable services without negatively impacting instruction. Moving the high school start times back to 7:30, while not specifically included in the Audit, will save us \$500,000. Reducing our use of interns and increasing the use of permanent substitutes will save us another \$159,000.

The most noteworthy program improvement is the new Elementary Staffing Model, which is explained in detail in the budget book on pages 157 and 158. We are proposing to increase services for struggling students in mathematics and language arts in each elementary school. Many of the public speakers commented on this proposal as worthy of public support.

Looking at the big picture of this budget proposal, approximately 90 percent of the requested budget increase (4.4 of the 4.9 percent) is attributable to what I would call "fixed costs" – contracted salaries, bus contract increases, medical insurance contributions, pension funding, loss of

grant funding and the like. I believe the Board of Education saw that the budget request represented an effort to maintain a high standard of excellence in our schools while finding savings wherever possible.

There is still a long way to go. The budget will be reviewed by the Board of Selectmen, Board of Finance and Representative Town Meeting before we know what our budget will be for next year.

**Burr** - Burr Elementary School and Math Resource Teacher/Instructional Improvement Teacher, **Bret Henkel**, were recently recognized at The 17th Annual Connecticut Elementary Schools Program Recognition Banquet sponsored by the Connecticut Association of Schools for their Flexible Grouping in the Mathematics Program in Grades 3-5.

**Dwight** - Students collected over 100 coats for Waltersville School in Bridgeport. Student Council members helped with the collection and delivery.

**Holland Hill** - Holland Hill School held an interactive sing-along, led by **Jon Noyes**, Holland Hill Music teacher, that encompassed songs to celebrate many different holidays and highlight different holiday traditions around the world. Parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins were all invited to come share in the joy of the holiday season and celebrate "Holland Hill style".



**Jennings** - The school celebrated *Hat Day*. The money raised was used to purchase holiday gifts for families in Fairfield.

**McKinley** - A class of grade 1, 2 and 3 students traveled to the *Yale Center for British Art* for their first in a series of lessons on visual literacy conducted in the art gallery. The students are learning to carefully observe paintings and then use detailed words to write about their observations. The visual literacy project has been coordinated by **Kathy Reddy**, McKinley Art teacher.



**Mill Hill** - The Language Arts Challenge Group had a visit from Eliana, an au pair from Colombia, South America who is living in Southport on a 2-year cultural exchange visa. She is also a member of the Global Awareness organization designed to promote multi-cultural understanding and appreciation in elementary and middle school classrooms.



Eliana shared information about her native country, through an interactive PowerPoint and videos, and provided each student with a "passport" to record the information they learned and an inflatable globe.

Students recently ran a challenging, hilly 1-mile course around the campus of Dwight Elementary School. A large crowd cheered all 137 runners on and helped celebrate at the finish line. Unexpected rain prompted last minute changes to the course (to avoid the muddy field and track), and the varying terrain was a hit with all runners.

**Riverfield** - Grade 4 & 5 students and parents recently attended *Riverfield's Nutmeg Book Club* and discussed eight different books. Five years ago there were less than five boys in the club, and this year more than half of the club members are boys. This year, for the first time, there were many dads at the meeting reading with their children.

**Sherman** - All grade 2 students made a large collection of toys, clothing and blankets for Operation Hope. They sent three boxes, one from each 2nd grade classroom, full of holiday poppers and cards.
