Statement of Purpose

The purpose of this class is to explore the many housing and interior options that meet different individual taste and household needs. This course provides students the opportunity to develop skills in applying the elements and principles of design to interiors. Projects are integrated throughout the course to provide applications as the students study: architecture, furniture styles and constructions, surface treatments and backgrounds, design and function of space and lighting. Design and Description

This course will provide a practical hands-on experience in the world of interior design. In addition to an emphasis on careers, students will learn the elements, principles and goals of interior design. Students will also spend time practicing room and furniture layout with computer programs, and work with various wall treatments, painting techniques, accessorizing, etc. 1 credit, semester course
